B. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR SENIOR COLLEGE PROGRAM

Graduates of the Guttman Community College A.A. degree in Urban and Community Studies will qualify for admission into the CUNY School of Labor and Urban Studies' (SLU) Bachelor of Arts degree in Urban and Community Studies if they have maintained a minimum overall GPA of 2.5 and are in good standing at GCC. Applicants will follow the standard admissions process, which includes completing a transfer application and SLU's supplemental application form. In addition, applicants must compose a personal essay.

GCC graduates will be awarded 60 transfer credits toward the bachelor's degree based on the current (fall 2014) GCC Urban Studies curriculum. Should that curriculum, or the curriculum of the SLU program in Urban and Community Studies change, it will be necessary to reevaluate the transfer agreement. Courses in math and English require a grade of C or better for transfer in accordance with current University policy. Upon matriculation into the B.A. program in Urban Studies, students will be required to fulfill elective and major requirements specified on the following pages.

SENIOR COLLEGE UPPER DIVISION COURSES REMAINING FOR BACCALAUREATE DEGREE

Prerequisites and Major Courses

The interdisciplinary curriculum includes General Education courses and a 36-credit major with concentrations, allowing students to define an area of special interest in the broader field of Urban and Community Studies. General Education requirements will incorporate the principles outlined by CUNY's Pathways to Degree Completion initiative, which were designed to ensure transferability as well as a broad-based educational foundation.

To meet requirements, students must complete a total of 36 credits in the program, outlined in the table below. This table lists the courses required for completing the B.A. in Urban and Community Studies. GCC students may apply a maximum of 12 earned credits (four three-credit courses) to the major, based upon course equivalencies in the summary below. Remaining courses in the major must be completed at SLU.* Credits taken at GCC that do not apply towards the major may be transferred as electives.

*The major includes both three- and four-credit courses. A variable-credit Independent Study may be used to earn one or more credits necessary to fulfill degree requirements.

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Procedures for evaluating the agreement, e.g., tracking the number of students who transfer under the articulation agreement and their success:

1. Procedures for reviewing, updating, modifying or terminating agreement:

Guttman Community College faculty and the CUNY School of Labor and Urban Studies faculty will review and analyze the strength of the curriculum and the success of students on an annual basis as part of their annual assessment activities. Modifications will be made as required.

When either of the programs undergo changes, this articulation agreement will be reviewed and revised as necessary by one or two faculty members from the relevant department of each institution.

2. Procedures for evaluating agreement, i.e., tracking the number of students who transfer under the articulation agreement and their success:

The CUNY Institutional Research Database will be used to track performance (in terms of credit accumulation and GPA) and persistence (in terms of retention and graduation) of all Guttman Community College students who transfer to CUNY senior colleges.

3. Sending and receiving college procedures for publicizing agreement, e.g., college catalogs, transfer adviser, websites, etc.:




