### B. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR SENIOR COLLEGE PROGRAM

- An associate's degree (A.A.) in Urban Studies from BMCC
- Minimum GPA of 2.5
- Grade of C or better in freshman composition, its equivalent, or a higher-level English course
- Grade of C or better in a credited math course

BMCC graduates with an A.A. in Urban Studies will be granted, upon admission into the B.A. in Urban and Community Studies program at SLU, a total of 60 transfer credits. An additional 60 credits will be required to earn the B.S. in Urban and Community Studies at SLU.

### C. TRANSFER CREDITS AWARDED

BMCC graduates who complete the Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree in Urban Studies will receive 60 credits toward the Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) degree in the Urban and Community Studies program at SLU.

## **G. ARTICULATION AGREEMENT FOLLOW-UP PROCEDURES**

1. *Procedures for reviewing, updating, modifying or terminating agreement:*

When either of the degree programs involved in this agreement undergoes a change, the agreement will be reviewed and revised accordingly by faculty from each institution's respective departments or programs, selected by their Chairpersons and/or program directors.

2. *Procedures for evaluating agreement (i.e., tracking the number of students who transfer under the articulation agreement and their success):*

Each year SLU will provide BMCC with the following information: a) the number of BMCC graduates who applied to the program; b) the number of BMCC students who were accepted into the program; c) the number of BMCC students who enrolled; and d) the aggregate GPA of these enrolled students at SLU.

3. *Sending and receiving college procedures for publicizing agreement (e.g., college catalogs, transfer advisers, websites, etc.):*

- This articulation agreement will be publicized on BMCC's website and SLU's website.
- Transfer advisors at BMCC will promote this agreement with eligible students.

4. *Campus Updates to Transfer Credit Rules:*

Each college will update their transfer rules in CUNYfirst based on the agreed upon course evaluation, as indicated in this documents. When either college makes course revisions to courses included in the agreement, they will notify the other party.
