## ABOUT THE CUNY SCHOOL OF LABOR AND URBAN STUDIES

The CUNY School of Labor and Urban Studies (SLU) offers undergraduate and graduate degree programs in Labor Studies and Urban Studies that are designed to meet the needs of working adults as well as traditional-age college students seeking to learn more about the challenges confronting poor and working-class populations in the workplace and the community.

The School also collaborates with other CUNY schools to offer a range of college-credit programs designed to provide workers with the academic and technical skills they need for professional advancement. Its faculty includes distinguished scholars in the social sciences as well as expert practitioners in government, labor, and public service. In addition to its academic programs, SLU sponsors research, organizes public forums and conferences, and publishes a national journal, New Labor Forum: A Journal of Ideas, Analysis, and Debate.

In 2018 SLU opened its doors as a self-standing school, an expansion of the Joseph S. Murphy Institute for Worker Education and Labor Studies, named for the former CUNY Chancellor and tireless advocate for the labor movement and worker education. The Institute traces its roots to 1984, when CUNY collaborated with three New York City unions to establish a worker education program at Queens College. That program started with just 52 students.

Today, more than 1,500 students are enrolled in SLU's degree and certificate programs and in workforce development programs across the University, and the leaders of 27 labor and community organizations serve on SLU's Advisory Board. The Joseph S. Murphy Institute continues to be an integral element of the School, focusing on education for workers and union members and serving as a research and resource center for publications and public programming.

The vision for this School derives from its core values: access to education, diversity at every level, social justice, and equality for all. Its goals are to expand higher education opportunities for workers; prepare students who aspire to careers in public service and movements for social justice; promote civic engagement; provide leadership development for union and community activists; and help workers achieve greater economic security. Its perspective is unique, addressing the needs of its constituents while helping New York City and State fulfill their needs for a well-educated, highly skilled workforce.

To accomplish its goals, the School has four foundational pillars: Labor Studies, Urban Studies, Workforce Development, and Community Service. Of equal importance, these pillars support a range of intellectual aspirations and practical needs, and serve as a gateway to college for many workers and working-class communities.

## CUNY BOARD OF TRUSTEES Michael Arvanites

MICHAEL ARVANITES, B.A., a native Staten Islander, serves as Staten Island's Trustee to the City University of New York; having been unanimously approved by the State Senate and appointed by Mayor Bill DeBlasio, effective July 1, 2017, for a term that ends in 2024.


The Board of Trustees provides oversight for a quarter-million students and thousands of faculty and staff at 25 campuses. Michael has served as a top advisor to State Assemblyman Eric Vitaliano, City Councilmember Michael McMahon, Councilmember Kamillah Hanks and State Senator Diane Savino, as well as Liaison to City Council Speaker Christine Quinn. He also served as surveyor to the Board of Elections, and has worked on many campaigns.

When working for private industry he provided safety, training and advocacy to the transportation and construction industries, serving as VP of Operations for the Black Car Fund, representing 25,000 drivers; and representing 2,500 safety professionals as the CEO of the Safety Professional Association.

Michael, an Eagle Scout, started volunteering very early in life, for On Your Mark INC, and the Eden II School for the Disabled, where his brother Steven is a participant and lives with autism. Advocacy for those with disabilities drove Michael into politics, advocating for group homes at civic meetings beginning at the age of seven years old.

He is the Vice Chair Eden II Programs for the Disabled. Michael Arvanites lives in the Castleton Corners neighborhood of Staten Island.

Michael serves as Chair of the Board's Student Life Committee, and is a member of the Executive Committee and the Committee on Facilities Planning and Management.



### CITY UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK CHANCELLOR FÉLIX V. MATOS RODRÍGUEZ

Félix V. Matos Rodríguez is the eighth Chancellor of The City University of New York (CUNY), and the first educator of color and the first Latino to lead the nation's largest urban public university, which serves 240,000 degree-seeking students across 25 New York City campuses.

An accomplished and award-winning historian who worked at three CUNY campuses before his appointment as chancellor on May 1, 2019, Matos Rodríguez is driven by his belief in CUNY's unparalleled effectiveness in propelling students up the economic ladder, along with the interconnected role the University plays in lifting New York.

To build on CUNY's unrivaled role as an engine of economic mobility, Matos Rodríguez has focused on removing barriers to students' success. The Chancellor has redoubled CUNY's emphasis on the career outcomes of its graduates, developing a series of public-private partnerships with some of New York's largest employers and new pipelines for students to enter the workforce.

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic during the first year of his tenure, the Chancellor oversaw the system's swift pivot to remote learning and worked to guide the University through the many challenges that emerged. The Chancellor's Emergency Relief Fund, launched in April 2020, provided grants to thousands of CUNY students, including undocumented students who were excluded from financial relief by the federal government. Using federal Higher Education Emergency Relief funds, CUNY erased more than \$100 million in unpaid tuition and fees for more than 57,000 students and ended the practice of holding transcripts of students with outstanding balances.

Driven by a deeply held commitment to accessibility, inclusion and excellence in higher education, Matos Rodríguez has built a diverse team of tested leaders to serve on his cabinet and has appointed a diverse, highly accomplished group of 14 college presidents and deans.

A historian, he has served the University for nearly 25 years as a member of the faculty at Hunter College and director of Hunter's Center for Puerto Rican Studies (CENTRO), and as president of Hostos Community College and Queens College. He left CUNY for several years in 2005, returning to his native Puerto Rico to serve as an adviser to the governor and, later, as Secretary of the Department of Family Services. Matos Rodríguez holds a B.A. from Yale University and a doctorate in history from Columbia University.

### VICE CHANCELLOR FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS DENISE B. MAYBANK

Denise B. Maybank is the vice chancellor for student affairs at The City University of New York. In this role, she assumes responsibility for coordinating the functions of the University's Central Office to guide the work of supporting student development from recruitment to completion. Under her leadership, Student Affairs facilitates the academic progress and success of students through holistic approaches to engagement beyond the classroom, addressing areas such as health and wellbeing, essential needs, student government and leadership development.

Prior to joining CUNY, Maybank served as the vice president and associate provost for student affairs and services at Michigan State University. During her 15-year tenure there, she served in progressive leadership roles beginning as an associate vice president in 2005. Maybank contributed to significant initiatives structuring the undergraduate experience; developed partnerships with the Graduate School and colleges to initiate the Graduate Student Life and Wellness emphasis; and conceived and implemented lasting innovative programs and services.

Throughout her career, she has been a member of professional associations representing the disciplines and contexts in which she serves. She is a member of the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities (APLU) Board of Directors, representing the Council on Student Affairs; she values the opportunities to have her voice and expertise included in national initiatives on higher education. As an active member of the communities in which she lives, she has served on various boards of directors for civic and social service organizations, often being elected to leadership positions. She is also an active member of her church community and sorority.

A lifelong learner, Maybank has earned additional credentials as an educational leader through the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and the Harvard Institute for Educational Management. She holds a doctorate in counseling psychology from Michigan State University and a Master of Arts in educational administration from Teachers College, Columbia University. Maybank is a proud CUNY alumna, having earned a Bachelor of Arts in elementary education from Brooklyn College.



VALEDICTORIAN

Joseph Newswander

Joseph is a graduating senior in the Labor Studies B.A. program. His journey has been advocacy and activism-driven since he co-organized a walkout demonstration at his Utah high school in response to school shootings. Since then, he has advocated for students, retirees, patients, and coworkers in various roles, such as service advocate and learning coordinator, focusing on equity-driven education policy, social determinants of health, and systemic change.

He transferred to SLU in 2022 from SUNY Old Westbury. Here at SLU, Joseph currently serves in Student Union leadership as a Steering Committee Member and student technology fee delegate. In October 2024, Joseph was elected Vice Chair for Senior Colleges in the CUNY University Student Senate, where he advocates for student voices and higher education funding across administrative and political mediums, as through his representative membership in the Research and Innovation subcommittee of the Board of Trustees. He is also a Union Semester alumnus and currently works full time at 1199SEIU Training and Employment Funds addressing workforce shortages and occupational segregation in New York's healthcare sector through research and program implementation.

After graduation, he's focusing on his role at 1199SEIU Training Funds, passing the torch to succeeding student leaders, working on his Spanish, preparing for the LSAT, and becoming more involved in the community through continued activism and service.



### SALUTATORIAN Latoya Fisher

Latoya Fisher has been employed by the City of New York for the past 16 years, serving in a myriad of roles that have been both challenging and rewarding. A proud union member of CWA-1180, Communications Workers of America, AFL-CIO, Latoya brings a commitment to service to her work.

Her daughter, Malaika, has been the most influential force in Latoya's educational journey. Inspired by Malaika, Latoya pursued her B.A. in Urban and Community Studies at SLU and remains driven by the desire to be the best version of herself. Through her own journey, she hopes to set an example for Malaika, demonstrating that with perseverance, anything is achievable, regardless of the stage of life one is in.

Having witnessed firsthand the injustices faced by students and parents in the New York City Department of Education system — particularly those from lower socio-economic backgrounds — Latoya is passionate about advocating for change. She is focused on addressing the complexities within current education policies that affect grading, promotion, transfers, and graduation. Rather than seeking to be the face of change, Latoya aspires to be the person behind the scenes, writing and overseeing policy changes that will foster a more equitable education system for all students.



# GRADUATE STUDENT SPEAKER Kaarthika Thakker

Kaarthika is an immigrant and organizer based in Brooklyn. She organizes tech workers and most recently has been supporting the Federal Unionist Network as an organizer.

Her capstone is about organizing around layoffs in the tech industry. She is the former co-chair of the NYC Democratic Socialists of America, a 7,000-person volunteer organization that believes working people should run society, not billionaires. She has been involved in running electoral campaigns for candidates who focus on working-class issues and do not accept any corporate or special-interest money.

In 2021, while working for State Assemblymember Zohran Mamdani, she was heavily involved in the taxi drivers' hunger strike that won millions in debt relief for drivers, as well as the fight to stop a polluting fracked gas power plant in Astoria. She has organized community support for Amazon and Starbucks workers in fights for their first contracts, especially during a historic strike this winter.

After graduation, she's going to attend UC Berkeley Law School to become a labor lawyer.



# KEYNOTE SPEAKER AND HONORARY DEGREE RECIPIENT Erica Smiley

Erica Smiley is the Executive Director of Jobs With Justice. A long-time organizer and movement leader, Smiley has been spearheading strategic organizing and policy interventions for Jobs With Justice for nearly 15 years. Prior to taking up her current position with the organization, Smiley served as organizing director for Jobs With Justice, developing campaigns that resulted in transformative changes to how working people organize and are civically engaged at their workplaces and in their communities. During her tenure at Jobs With Justice, Smiley has served in numerous leadership capacities

including as organizing director and as senior field organizer for the southern region.

Serving as one of the lead architects, Smiley has been instrumental in developing the strategic vision of Jobs With Justice to build power for impacted working people through expanding their collective bargaining power as one way to redefine and claim their democracy, while addressing issues of inequality and poverty. This includes founding the Advancing Black Strategists Initiative and co-convening a national strategy for essential workers.

She co-authored <u>The Future We Need: Organizing for Economic Democracy in the Twenty First Century</u>, a book on collective bargaining and democracy with Sarita Gupta, released in April 2022. She has also authored several related articles in the New Labor Forum, Dissent Magazine, the Journal on Class, Race and Corporate Power, The Labor Education and Research Association (LERA), and other publications lifting strategic organizing, movement building, direct action, and discourse as core strategies for advancing work in this arena. In 2025, Smiley was awarded an honorary doctoral degree from the School of Labor and Urban Studies (SLU) and the City University of New York (CUNY). She was previously awarded a Bellagio Fellowship and Residency from the Rockefeller Foundation in 2023.

As one of the few queer black women leaders in the labor movement, Smiley has helped to seed numerous initiatives that position and prioritize the demands and voices of vulnerable working people in socio-economic and political decisions that directly and indirectly impact their individual lives, families, and communities. As a seasoned organizer, she has been a vocal advocate for mobilizing our movements to be aligned around a common agenda for working families.

Prior to joining Jobs With Justice, Smiley organized with community groups and unions such as the Tenants and Workers Support Committee (now Tenants and Workers United) in Virginia and SEIU Local 500 in Baltimore. Her career in social and economic justice began in the reproductive justice field, serving as national field director for Choice USA (now United for Reproductive and Gender Equity—URGE) where she received the Young Women of Achievement Award in 2004.

Her passion for advancing innovations that prioritize the South is evident on the boards she serves on today and in the past, which includes the board of the Highlander Research and Education Center in Tennessee, a catalyst for grassroots organizing and movement building in Appalachia and the South, and the leadership council of the Workers Defense Project based in Texas. Additionally, she is on the board of the SEIU Education and Support Fund, the Workers Lab, and she participates in the Bargaining for the Common Good advisory committee. In 2021, she was appointed by the Board of Governors at Rutgers University to sit on the State Advisory Committee for the School of Management and Labor Relations.

Smiley is originally from Greensboro, N.C. where she is a proud product of public schools—ultimately graduating from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She currently resides in New Jersey.

### COMMENCEMENT TRADITIONS AND SYMBOLS

### **ACADEMIC REGALIA**

The academic regalia dates back to the Middle Ages, when learned persons at the time wore long hooded cloaks to fend off the cold within rock castle walls. The traditional attire was transported to this world when Kings College, Columbia University, first began using it for its commencement ceremony. This practice was codified in 1895 by the National Conference on Academic Costume and Ceremony and a plan known initially as the "Intercollegiate System" was formally adopted. Today, commencement exercises across American universities all carry on the traditional costume and conduct the ceremony with three essential elements: the academic procession, the conferring of degrees, and the Commencement address.

Those with doctoral degrees wear the longest hood. The intermediate length designates a master's degree and a shorter length, a bachelor's degree. Medieval practice associated certain colors with specific academic pursuits. The silk-lined hoods represent a specific field of study with an official color trim (Citron: Labor and Urban Studies).

### THE SCHOOL SEAL

The School seal is in a circular shape with silver and warm red hues. The School name circles around the logo, and inside the seal is an open book, with the left page portraying a gear, and the right page, urban life. These symbols represent the core values of the School: access to education, diversity at every level, social justice, and equality for all.

### THE MACE

The Mace, carried by the Grand Marshall, dates back to 12,000 B.C., when it was used as a weapon during battle. Today, the mace is carried at all academic ceremonies and is used to represent the responsibility to protect our education institutions and often times represents the core values of an institution. The Grand Marshal, carrying the Mace at Commencement and Convocation, heralds the arrival of the academic procession and concludes the ceremony.

### **GRAND MARSHAL**

The Grand Marshal is the faculty member who leads the processional and recessional, bears the School's Mace, and calls the Commencement ceremonies to order.
